Law enforcement officers should not use participants as confidential informants Cornerstone Beliefs of Treatment Court

How does this translate through the lens of law enforcement?

- Addiction is a **disease** of the brain.
- **Recurrence** is a part of the **treatment** process.
- Dealing with participant **trauma** is a big part of the work we do.
- Co-occurring **mental health** disorders are common.
- The **multidisciplinary team** approach is the key to success, especially the relationships between treatment, probation and law enforcement.
- Practicing **equity** and **inclusion** are critical.

- Assign officers to geographic community
- Work in community you live
- Continuity of assignment
- Walk community
- Draws on expertise and experience of LEO
- Change patrol deployment practices to emphasize time to conduct community engagement

- Building relationships prevents crime
 - Agency relationships
 - Personal relationships
- Join and participate in community organizations, local meetings, public service activities



II. What does CP look like?

- Oath: do no harm
- Use respectful language
- Goal: avoid the use of force even if allowed
- With community: plan and create multidisciplinary community/law enforcement team approaches for crisis situations
- Crisis intervention teams and Treatment Courts deal with same issues

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- Mental health
- Homelessness
- Substance use
- Domestic violence
- Human trafficking
- Child abuse

Correlation between substance abuse and criminal justice involvement



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More than 80% of crime is drug or alcohol fueled

What if we just put them in prison?

Half are rearrested within the first year

Two-thirds are rearrested within three years

Monitor and Refer

Law enforcement officers who work in the community are in the best position to engage, identify, and refer individuals

- Treatment court program
- Diversion programs
- Ancillary services



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Team Communication and Decision Making

Law Enforcement Input

Staffing and Courtroom Interaction

- Multidisciplinary team serves essentially as a panel of "expert witnesses" providing legal and scientific expertise for the judge
- Assessment results pertaining to a participant's eligibility for treatment court and treatment and supervision needs
- Attainment of treatment program phase requirements
- Commission of or arrests for new offenses that treatment professionals may be aware of
- Discuss participant progress

Core Competencies of CIT Model

- Community collaboration
- Accessible crisis system
- Training for law enforcement and first responders
- Behavioral health staff training
- Family/consumer/advocate participation

Focus is on breaking down silos and building relationships between organizations and stakeholders



Veterans Population Considerations



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- Challenges including TBI, Mental Health diagnosis, Substance Use Disorder, PTSD
- 2000-2018 383,947 diagnosed with TBI
- 460,000 with PTSD
- 345,000 Iraq and Afghanistan war veterans with substance use disorder
- PTSD grew 400% amongst deployed U.S. troop between 2004 – 2012

Law Enforcement Challenge – interactions can become volatile without specialized skill sets to interact with veterans

Veterans Population Considerations



Law enforcement challenge interactions can become volatile without specialized skill sets to interact with veterans

- Isolation
- Depression
- Transition to civilian life
- Feeling weak or inadequate
- No healthy coping skills
- Self medicating with drugs and alcohol
- Socioeconomic factors
- Flashbacks
- Stigma

- Trauma informed care approach
- Veterans awareness
- Suicide prevention
- Autism awareness
- Multidisciplinary team approach
- Rapid Response wrap around services

The progress of many clients will be marked by cycles of recovery, relapse, and repeated treatments; often spanning many years...


> Think Sequential Intercept Model
